Dear Padre,

Where did the idea of an Easter bunny come from? What about the Easter egg?

The Easter bunny is really a hare which, according to an Egyptian legend, is a symbol of the moon. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon that occurs after the twenty-first day of March. Put this together, and we have an Easter bunny.



Early Christians gave new meaning to the Roman proverb *Omne vivum ex ovo*, which means, "All life comes from an egg." A hatching chick represented the risen Christ emerging from the shell of a tomb on Easter morning. Consequently, eggs were prohibited during the Lenten fast and were reintroduced at the Easter meal and also shared as decorated gifts. In 1610, a prayer by Pope Paul V blessed the egg "that it may become a wholesome sustenance to Thy faithful servants, eating in thankfulness to Thee, on account of the Resurrection of Our Lord."

In some parts of the world, children carry baskets and torches and sing Easter carols as they go from place to place. They are given brightly colored eggs to put in their baskets. In other places, eggs are carried to church and blessed by the priests. The eggs are taken home and placed in the center of the table as the main dish at the Easter feast. Visitors to the house during Easter week are offered this sacred food of the resurrection. Happy Easter!

Life without a Blankie

aith can have the look of high dives and learning to ride a bike without training wheels and life without one's "blankie." All are confrontations with the specter of death asking us to have faith. From youth to old age, our lives seem to be laced with the loss of control, and unless we embrace such moments, not only will we never really grow up, neither will we ever become people of faith who live in the resurrection.

The Easter Gospels are about women and men who arrive at the tomb but hesitate going in; it is the home of death. Yet they become believers after they have entered that home of death and discover it to be abandoned. Over the years, I have become convinced that the only way to become a believer in the resurrection is to walk into the tomb yourself and there discover that where you thought death was present now has been abandoned. That is the pattern of coming to faith.

Usually such moments do not have the look of faith. They tend to seem more akin to death than any promise of new life—like having to move to a new city or a new school, or abandoning an addiction, or confronting a problem through counseling, or aging, or grieving over lost love. They all can have the look of tombs yet they are also where we find the beginnings of new life. Risk it often enough and so discover new life, and we begin to believe in the reality of resurrection—Jesus' and ours. •

HAPPY EASTER!

My dear friends, alleluia! What a joy it is to be with all of you this day as we celebrate our incredible God --- a God who loves us more than we could ever imagine. And on a day such as today, most words just won't do --- don't accurately express the joy we are feeling, don't express the hope that fills our hearts, don't express the comfort this day brings. Only one word will do --alleluia! It's been a while since we've been able to say that.

And in one sense, we are gathered here because of one thing, one event, one act, one miracle --- the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus. That goes without saying. And in the earliest days of Christianity, this one, simple, profound experience was the totality of the Christian message, was the Good News, was about all they could say about what they (or others) had witnessed.

The "meaning" of the death and resurrection of Jesus had yet to be unpacked, yet to be understood, yet to be brought into focus. With joy let us go to all the nations and proclaim the Good News that Christ was dead but He has risen. Fr. Peter

THE READINGS OF THIS WEEK

• For years, Jesus had confounded even his closest disciples. He insisted the crowds stay for a meal when all they had were a few loaves and fish. He told them to turn the other cheek, that it is the poor and down-trodden that are blessed, and that each of them had a cross to carry. He revealed that he would be condemned to death. Now he's disappeared from the tomb they'd buried him in just three days before. Mary Magdalene is frantic. Peter and John are rendered speechless. All three are confused. What has happened? None of them yet understood that they had to look for him in a different way. Jesus may confound us as well. We may not find him where we expect, or when we expect, or in the way we expect. But let us take comfort in the confidence that no matter where we go, no matter how confounded we are, he will find us.

• In his letter to the Colossians, Paul gives us a clue as to finding the risen Lord: "Seek what is above" (3:1). If we have died with Christ, as we did in baptism, then we have been raised with Christ. This ought to be our perspective. There is a permanence to what is above that cannot be achieved on earth. How relatively fleeting even our happiest times have been: our wedding day, the birth of a child, a career accomplishment. The Resurrection frees us to seek love and mercy and life in a way that outlasts what is on earth.

• The Resurrection transforms us. Holding the promise of resurrection for ourselves and those we love gives hope and meaning to our life. It transforms us. But we are also transformed by the power God has to raise us from our graves of sinfulness and our tombs of despair. In many ways, our lives are reborn by the Resurrection, like a fresh batch of dough, as Paul told the Corinthians, and by focusing our minds on what is above, as he told the Colossians. A God who has the power to transform death to new life has the power to transform our ordinary, difficult lives to new lives as well. May we recognize that our lives stand ever ready for transformation.

• Durante años Jesús había confundido hasta a sus más íntimos discípulos. Insistió en que la gente se quedara a comer cuando todo lo que tenían eran unos cuantos panes y pescados. Les dijo que ofrecieran su otra mejilla, que los bendecidos eran los pobres y los oprimidos, y que cada uno de ellos tenía una cruz que cargar. Él reveló que sería condenando a muerte. Ahora se ha desaparecido del sepulcro donde lo habían sepultado sólo tres días atrás. María Magdalena está en pánico. Pedro y Juan se han quedado mudos. Los tres están confundidos. ¿Qué ha sucedido? Ninguno de ellos entendía todavía que tenían que buscar a Jesús de una manera diferente. Puede que Jesús nos confunda a nosotros también. Puede que no lo encontremos donde lo esperamos, o cuándo lo esperamos, ni de la manera que esperamos. Pero consolémonos y no dudemos en que no importa donde vayamos, no importa cuán confundidos estemos, él nos va a encontrar.

• En su carta a los colosenses, Pablo nos ofrece una pista en cuanto a encontrar al Señor resucitado: "Busquen los bienes de arriba" (3, 1). Si hemos muerto con Cristo, como sucedió en nuestro Bautismo, también hemos resucitado con Cristo. Ésta ha de ser nuestra perspectiva. Existe una permanencia en lo que es de arriba, que no puede lograrse en la tierra. Qué relativamente fugaces han sido, aun nuestros momentos más felices: nuestro día de bodas, el nacimiento de un hijo o una hija, los éxitos en una carrera. La resurrección nos da la libertad de buscar el amor, la misericordia y la vida de una manera que subsiste lo que hay en la tierra.

• La resurrección nos transforma. Albergar la promesa de la resurrección para nosotros y para nuestros seres queridos da esperanza y propósito a nuestra vida. Nos transforma. Pero también somos transformados por el poder de Dios para sacarnos de los sepulcros de nuestros pecados y de nuestra desesperanza. Por la resurrección renacemos de muchas maneras, como una masa nueva y fermentada, como le dice Pablo a los corintios, y con nuestro corazón puesto en los bienes del cielo, como le dice a los colosenses.

NATIONAL EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL DO THIS IN REMEMBRANCE OF ME, PART 23: The "Fifth Gospel"

More on the Gospels? This week, for our final Gospel topic, we are going to discuss the fifth Gospel. *Fifth Gospel?! But Father, you went into detail last time about why there are four Gospels!* Before I cause too much confusion, let me clarify that the fifth "Gospel" is not one that is written. It is the place where Jesus lived, the place where he walked on the water and

worked miracles, the place where he celebrated the Last Supper with the Apostles, and the place where he carried the Cross and offered himself as the perfect sacrifice to the Father for the forgiveness of sins: the Holy Land.

The Land Where Jesus Walked

A New Catholic Encyclopedia article quotes Gino Concetti's 1974 article in L'Osservatore Romano: "The geographical and historical setting...bears a quite special witness (to Christ). It has been said that the Holy Land is itself a Gospel, the fifth Gospel. The judgment is not an exaggerated one. [...] Those places that Christians have venerated, since the beginning, as sacred because sanctified by the Savior, are still able today, 2000 years later, to re-echo his voice and his message" (New Catholic Encyclopedia, p. 245). Similarly, Pope Francis recently encouraged journalists to "keep telling stories from the Holy Land, calling it the 'Fifth Gospel,"" a title which "has been invoked by popes from Paul VI to Benedict XVI to describe the Holy Land" (Courtney Mares, Pope Francis: The story of the Holy Land is the "Fifth Gospel" CNA, January 17, 2022). The Holy Land is more than a spot on the map half a world away: it is a true witness to the Lord Jesus as the place where he lived and walked and died for our sins!

Since I had the privilege to spend some time in the places where Jesus walked, the words of the four Gospels truly do feel different. Standing by the shore of the Sea of Galilee and feeling the afternoon breeze, it is not hard to see where a large crowd could have gathered to listen to Jesus. Experiencing the dusty, dry environment brings a deeper understanding of the moment Jesus asks the Samaritan woman for a drink. Walking up the stone steps in part of the Old City of Jerusa-lem, the Way of the Cross is vivid and closer.

Unfortunately, the Holy Land continues to be a place of turmoil and violence. As an important center for three world religions (Christianity, Judaism, and Islam), there has been a long history of ongoing tensions. Although leaders have worked together to secure and protect important religious shrines and historical places, the struggle for territory and control has long made the Holy Land a place of unrest and uncertainty. Sadly, this uncertainty has at times prevented many Christians from journeying to Israel and walking in the places and pathways that Christ walked, losing an opportunity to grow closer to him by walking in his footsteps. May our respect for this unique "fifth Gospel" inspire us to pray always for peace and justice and for the opportunity for each soul to freely seek out the true Savior of the world, Jesus Christ.

For Reflection:

1. Next time you read or hear a Gospel passage referring to a place Jesus visited, find its location on a map. You can watch <u>this video</u> that offers a virtual tour of the Holy Land. Imagine yourself in that place with Jesus and any others in the Gospel passage. If you have time, learn more about the condition of that place now. Pray for those who live there, that they, too, might encounter Jesus in the land where he lived.

2. Do you have any images or artifacts from the Holy Land? If possible, display such items in a suitable area of your home as a way to remember and pray for the Church there. (Fr. Luke Spanagel)
