

DEAR PADRE,

IS IT A SIN TO USE GOD'S NAME IN PROFANITY?

Is it a sin to use God's name in profanity? Profanity is obscene, vulgar language that may or may not include God's name. People may thoughtlessly ask God to condemn a person or a thing in their profanity, but if questioned, admit that they did not mean it literally. They say their angry words were not intended to deliberately ask God to harm someone and deliberate in-



tent is one requirement for what constitutes a sin. God who knows our hearts can determine if our misuse of his name is a form of venting, but the Second Commandment warns us that taking the Lord's name in vain does not please him, even if no harm to another is intended. The danger in constantly and carelessly using God's holy name profanely is that over time we can easily become desensitized to the practice, creating an irreverent attitude toward God that is offensive and may lead others into sin.

Recall that when we pray, "Hallowed be thy name" in the Lord's Prayer—the prayer Jesus taught his disciples—we ask God to enable us to give him the reverence that is due; it comes first before we ask anything for ourselves—a sure sign of our respect for God. **Because** God's name is holy, we mustn't abuse it. Despite the erosion of inhibitions against poor word choices in our time, consider this prayerful petition from the last verse of Psalm 19: "Let the words of my mouth be acceptable, / the thoughts of my heart before you, / Lord, my rock and my redeemer." **The Redemptorists/DearPadre.org**

APPLES AND PEARS

"Know thyself," advised the philosopher Socrates. Yet easier said than done. A recent public service ad warning about the dangers of smoking concludes, "The worst lies are the lies you tell yourself, like smoking isn't that dangerous." To admit the truth, to come to truth, to live the truth is no small thing. **H**ave you ever wondered why it takes a lifetime to come to wisdom, why we aren't born with all the wisdom we need? It would make life so much easier. When Jesus promised us the Spirit, he said, "I have much more to tell you, but you cannot bear it now. But when he comes, the Spirit of Truth, he will guide you to all truth" (John 16:12–13). To know ourselves and the truth of who we are can be a painful process, coming to terms with what we do not want to hear. So the Spirit brings us to that wisdom gradually, over the course of a lifetime, lest we run from it. Paul warns against "immorality and impurity and lust," and each of us at some point in our lives must come to terms with the truth that if we do not channel our sexuality healthfully it will mess up our lives. Paul warns against "hatred, rivalry, fury, dissensions," and each of us eventually realizes how any of those can ruin relationships and our very lives. Some of us learn such wisdom early in life, some late, yet

coming to Truth is a lifelong journey guided by the Spirit.

How many feast days does Mary Have?

At present, the Roman calendar commemorates 15 Mary days. Marian feasts accumulated through the centuries. They began to surface after the Council of Ephesus (431) bestowed the title "Godbearer" (*Theotokos*) on the mother of Jesus.

Four Marian celebrations are solemnities, the highest commemoration of the liturgical year: Mary, Mother of God (Jan. 1), Annunciation (March 25), Assumption (Aug. 15), and Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8). Three are feasts: Presentation of the Lord (Feb. 2), Visitation (May 31), and Birth of Mary (Sept. 8). Four are memorials, a simpler remembrance: Queenship of Mary (Aug. 22), Our Lady of Sorrows (Sept. 15), Our Lady of the Rosary (Oct. 7), and Presentation of Mary (Nov. 21). Four are optional memorials: Our Lady of Lourdes (Feb. 11), Immaculate Heart of Mary (second Saturday after Pentecost), Our Lady of Mt. Carmel (July 16), and Dedication of St. Mary Major Basilica (Aug. 5). The U.S. Bishops celebrate a 16th memorial for Our Lady of Guadalupe (Dec. 12).
